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A Note from Pastor Butler

Greetings, Beloved. As we pass the halfway point of the 2022 calendar year, reflect upon the mercies of God as they have been renewed before us. We began the year with an intentional period of prayer and consecration in January to focus our energy and to generate congregational synergy for the work God entrusts to us. What a meaningful time it was! Then we returned to in-person biannual fellowship with First Baptist Church Governors Drive in February, and was inspired by the preaching of Dr. Travis Collins, who waded through the murky water of America's original sin of racism. In March, we hosted a visiting team from the regulatory body that accredits our academy and, subsequently, received a reaffirmation of accreditation for the next five years. Special commendations go to our Head of School, Dr. Tammy Alexander, and the school board. April was a busy month observing the conclusion of Lent during Holy Week, rejoicing in the Easter hope, and looking toward Pentecost. We celebrated the nonagenarians of the congregation in May and bestowed upon them the Honor of the Griot. Indeed, it was a special recognition of the elders. And June brought recognition of our graduates, spirited fellowship among our youth during their annual week and fun intergenerational engagement during the carnival of Family Vacation Bible School. Oh, who can forget our kickball competition. My muscles sorely remember.

All these events required your participation and support. You have been stellar in this regard. Now as we engage the ministry activities of this latter part of the year, I invite you to kick into gear with us. First, we will share our annual summer revival the week of the 11th through the 14th of this month, under the theme: "Lord, Revive Thy Work," deduced from the prayer of Habakkuk (3:2). We will be favored to receive the preaching ministry of The Reverends Claybon Lea of California and Christopher Davis of Tennessee. In addition, four associate ministers to our congregation (3 new and 1 returning) will present the exposition of theme during the week. We are all to be present to reconnect with each other, to recommit ourselves to the ministry, and to reengage in the work.

Then, in August, we will adjust our Sunday worship and teaching schedule in the following ways. The Sunday School hour will begin at 8:15 a.m., with worship to follow at 9:30 a.m. The rationale for this change is primarily to rebuild and strengthen a major Christian education ministry of the congregation, and to afford more guests and families time to come to worship. As the Christian Education Committee prepares to resume in-person Sunday School teaching, those classes that have embraced a different time or day for meeting can continue, with the support of the Discipleship Minister. But this new schedule will give us ample opportunity to sustain consistent meetings for discipleship training. To

be sure, this is not the first time we have modified the times of worship services – and those previous times were before the pandemic that changed our worship times in 2020. Yes, some have inquired about a second service, but the need for its return has not yet come, for we still must convince many of our member-families to return to the campus, first. Since we are accustomed already to meeting in the middle of the start times of the former two services, it is easier to sustain this beginning time, and determine its effects and success by the end of the year.

Another exciting return to our congregational life will be Family Nights at 3509, beginning the first Wednesday in August. Based upon the success of the Vacation Bible School Model, we will serve an evening meal for the family and engage in vibrant learning, interaction, and fellowship each week, with the fifth Wednesday of month (when it occurs) concluding as an opportunity for intergenerational time. The midday study hour will continue uninterrupted.

Please look out for additional information concerning the first series to be taught in the coming weeks, and pursue this edition of The Communicator to remain informed about opportunities for growth, engagement, and service in the congregation. Let's make this latter half even greater than the former.

The Northeast District State Convention

The Alabama State Missionary Baptist Convention (ASMBC) was founded in 1868 to serve as the combined body of Baptist African American churches in the state of Alabama. This body works in missions, evangelism, and education, to strengthen congregations – their pastors and members – to do the work of Christ as an informed people.

Throughout its history, the ASMBC has worked to further the cause of all people not just here at home, but even abroad. In 1873, the state convention passed a motion during a meeting held at the Peace Baptist Church (Talladega) to create an institution of theological education to educate our young men. The first classes were held on January 1, 1878, on the campus of what is now known as Selma University. Our mission, in addition to our task of being a voice for the masses of underserved people, has been the furtherance and support of this great institution.

The ASMBC is comprised of four districts that make up its entire body. These districts, also known as wings, are divided by geographical location, and were formed in the early 1900s. The Northeast Convention is gearing up to carry out its annual session at the First Missionary Baptist Church.

On July 6-7, delegates, pastors and members, of churches south of the Tennessee state line, west of the Georgia state line, as low as Lafayette, and east of I-65 will converge on Huntsville to handle the business of this convention. One may ask, what is the business of the convention? The convention works to provide Christian education opportunities and raise funds for the support of Selma University and other denominational obligations. This year we will celebrate the tenure of faithful service of Presidents Clarence C. Carter, Kathleen W. Spradley, and James A. McKinney.

God has blessed this body to remain steadfast -- serving, training, and leading for over a century. Under the blessed hope of our heavenly Father, with the unwavering faithfulness of the Alabama Baptists, may

we continue to build upon this rich legacy of leading, learning, and loving – continuing the work of impacting the world for the cause of Christ.



FMBC READER'S CORNER

Celebration of Discipline, The Path to Spiritual Growth by Richard J. Foster

The *Celebration of Discipline* explores the Disciplines or Spiritual Practices of the Christian Faith to stay connected with God. These disciplines are doors to liberating ourselves of all of the hurt, pain, hatred, sorrow, and stress that plague us. The spiritual disciplines help us to regroove our minds, focus on what God wants from us, and liberate ourselves from our old ways of thinking to focus more on him. It is hard not to think about something God has done in our lives and not make a shift in our thinking.

Richard Foster has broken the book into three parts that show how each attribute of the spirit contributes to our daily lives. The Inward Disciplines are necessary to help our lives be transformed into a closer walk with God, The Outward Disciplines are what show up in the way we live and how we treat each other, and Corporate Disciplines in which everyone must play a part.

INWARD DISCIPLINES

The Discipline (commitment) of Meditation

One may ask, "How do you meditate?". Meditation is listening to God's word, reflecting on God's works, Rehearsing God's deeds, and ruminating (thinking and contemplating over and over again) on God's law. Paul writes to the church of Philippi, "Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy—meditate on these things."

In simple terms, this means loving and doing what is right according to God's word. David also lets us know in Psalm 1, Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the ungodly nor stands in the path of sinners, nor sits in the seat of the scornful; 2 But his delight is in the law of the LORD, and in His law he meditates day and night. 3 He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that brings forth its fruit in its season, whose leaf also

shall not wither; and whatever he does shall prosper. If you have the discipline of meditating and make it a practice, you shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water. Receiving constant nourishment for growth and you will always be in season. We should always keep our minds on what God wants us to think about and what he has already done in our lives.

The Discipline (commitment) of Prayer

The discipline of prayer is a talking-through dialogue with God. If we call ourselves Christians, we have to have a prayer life. Without prayer, we can not function. On page 33 of the book in paragraph 2 it states, "To pray is to change. Prayer is the central avenue God uses to transform us. If we are unwilling to change, we abandon prayer as a noticeable characteristic of our life. The closer we come to the heartbeat of God the more we see our need and the more we desire to be conformed to Christ." When we bow our heads and put our hands together in prayer to God, we are opening ourselves to transforming into what He wants us to be, what He needs us to do, we are giving ourselves totally to Him and releasing the hold that Satan has on us. We are starting a war against whatever is working against the will of God. We are saying that God has the final say. When we pray to God, we are allowing Him to move and shift things. We are saying to God that we know the outcome may not change but when we come out, we are changed because His Grace is sufficient.

The Discipline of Study

On page 62 Foster states, "The purpose of the spiritual discipline is the total transformation of the person. They aim to replace old destructive habits and thoughts with life-changing habits and thoughts." He gives us a few scriptures to reference:

- Romans 12-Transformation of the mind.
- Philippians 4:8-Think about these things.

We have so many tools for us to be able to study and not be left to our own devices. Studying God's Word allows us to transform our minds and we should continuously study so that God's word is poured into us. Studying involves

four steps: repetition, concentration, discipline, and reflection. Every time you learn something you are simultaneously unlearning something. I think of it as every time I learn something by practicing these disciplines, I am unlearning a bad habit or unlearning not to be stressed out about things that I cannot change or just simply looking at life differently. I am practicing keeping myself full of knowledge, faith, and wisdom.

The Discipline of Fasting

Fasting is a spiritual practice that we do to stay connected with God and not experience spiritual droughts. I know people cringe when they hear the word fast and that is only because society has deemed it necessary that we need to have three meals a day and eat a snack in between. We have it wrapped up in our mind if we haven't eaten, we are on the verge of starvation. Imagine how easy fasting would be if we focused and meditated on God.

OUTWARD DISCIPLINES-EXTERIOR LIFE

We embrace our Outward Disciplines so our lives can be radically transformed as a child of God. Our Outward Disciplines show up in the way we live and show up everywhere we show up. A life dedicated to the following.

- Simplicity-Solitude
- Submission
- Service

CORPORATE DISCIPLINES

We practice Corporate Disciplines through

- Worship
- Guidance
- Celebration

I have given some of the key factors that Foster mentions in this book, but I highly recommend that you read Richard Foster's book for yourself. Foster goes more in-depth with the discipline practices that can help on the journey of renewal this season. Our FMBC Summer Revival is focused on renewal and only through meditation, prayer, fasting, study, solitude, submission, service, and celebration, can we live together with integrity and love.



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Summer Revival Preachers



Dr. Claybon Lea, Jr. is the Senior Pastor of Mount Calvary Baptist Church in Fairfield and Suisun City, CA where he has served since 1999. He is the father of four remarkable children: Claybon III, Jillian, Christopher, and Jessica. A widely known and highly sought after preacher, teacher, lecturer, and leader, Dr. Lea has been blessed to travel the world sharing his gifts to the glory of God. A believer that "a call to preach is a call to preparation".

Dr. Lea has earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Religion from Morehouse College (where he was inducted into the Martin

Luther King, Jr. Board of Preachers), a Master of Divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary, a Doctor of Ministry degree from United Theological Seminary, and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Biblical Studies from Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary where he graduated with highest honors having written his dissertation on The Hermeneutics of Desmond Tutu. Dr. Lea serves on several boards and committees on local, state, and national levels. He is the immediate past Vice-President of the Far-West Region of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., a proud member of Omega Psi Phi, Incorporated, and a lifetime member of the NAACP. In addition, Dr. Lea is the author of "Lessons from a Dying Savior", a contributing author to multiple works, including "God's Word and Our Words", and in February, he released his second book, "Giant Lessons From David: Managing the Journey of Success".

Rev. Dr. Christopher B. Davis, Sr. is widely regarded as a "Preacher's Preacher". For nearly 30 years, Dr. Davis has attempted to preach, teach, and reach at the intersection of text and context. It is his abiding belief that if the Gospel is to be relevant, it must be real. Thus, giving birth to a theology that informs sociology. His mission for ministry remains the same, to take God's Word to a hurting and lost generation, as he follows his God-given mandate to "Build Believers to Build the Kingdom"

As senior pastor of St. Paul Baptist Church since 2000, Dr. Davis leads one of the most vibrant churches in Memphis. In the last twenty years, the nearly 150-year-old church has grown from approximately 200 members to over 1800. In addition to his work as a local church pastor, he also serves as President of the Tennessee Baptist Missionary and Educational Convention, Inc. A native of Proctor, Arkansas, Dr. Davis was called at the age of twenty-one to preach God's Word. He was licensed in the gospel ministry in 1994, and subsequently ordained in 1996. He graduated with Bachelor of Arts Degrees from the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville and Arkansas Baptist College. He earned the Master of Arts in Religion degree (*Cum Laude*) from Memphis Theological Seminary in Memphis, Tennessee.

In June 2007, Rev. Davis received the Doctor of Ministry Degree with special emphasis on Preaching and Leadership from the United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohio. He is presently a candidate for the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) Degree in Leadership, Anderson University, Anderson, South Carolina. Additional studies were completed at Regents Park College, University of Oxford, Oxford, England. He also holds the honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree from Arkansas Baptist College.

Dr. Davis has received numerous awards and recognition. One of the more notable includes, being named one of the "20 to Watch" by *The African American Pulpit Journal*. This list is announced every three years and clergy throughout the country are nominated. Dr. Davis has been inducted into the Martin Luther

King, Jr. Board of Preachers and Collegium of Scholars of Morehouse College. His sermons, *Deliverance Brought by Death* and *Living on the Left Side of God* have been published in the African American Pulpit Journal. Dr. Davis also previously served as a member of the Advisory Board of *The African American Pulpit*.

Dr. Davis was a contributor to *The African American Lectionary*, a collaborative project with the Kelly Miller Smith Institute of the Divinity School, Vanderbilt University. This resource is an online, Ecumenical Preaching and Worship Lectionary. He contributed to *I'm Challenged: Daily Meditations for Christian Living*, published 2009, Grant House Publishers. He's presently a contributor to *Working Preacher*, a Revised Common Lectionary Commentary for Bi-Vocational Clergy sponsored by Luther Seminary.

Dr. Davis serves as Associate Professor of Preaching and Pastoral Ministry and Associate Dean of Doctoral Studies at Memphis Theological Seminary, Memphis, Tennessee. His additional commitments include his work as a member of the Board of Directors for the Rise Foundation, Sisters Network, Inc., Greater Whitehaven Economic Development Corporation, Board of Trustees of Lemoyne-Owen College, Baptist Health Sciences University, American Baptist College, and the Board of Visitors at West Africa Theological Seminary, Lagos, Nigeria, where he also serves as an adjunct preaching professor.

In addition, Dr. Davis is an avid golfer, spades player, aspiring chef and life member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

Dr. Davis is married to the lovely Rhonda Richardson Davis and together they share five amazing children – Christopher II, Jaden, Allie, Jenna, and Savanna.

Operations & Maintenance Committee Updates



In an effort to ensure that all of our members have safe and convenient access to the campus, the Trustee O&M Committee and church staff are working on the following projects.

1. Handicap Parking Spaces - We will assess and ensure handicap parking lot spaces are the appropriate size and that the current handicap signs on the pavement are painted facing the correct direction. Some of the faded handicap signs will also be replaced and we will move the handicap parking signs closer to the sanctuary entrance. In addition, the Parking Ministry will continue monitoring the handicap parking spaces to ensure those parked there have a handicap tag or placard and will reserve additional parking spots for those with mobility concerns.
2. Handicap Access Ramps - We have a total of nine ramps or potential ramps in our parking lot and currently only one ramp is wheelchair accessible. We will assess the needs and increase the number of wheelchair accessible ramps as needed.
3. Sanctuary Entrance Near Choir Loft - We will assess and reconfigure the height of the stairs at this point of egress. Currently, there is a large drop off after the first two steps (see attached pictures).
4. Parking Lot Lighting - We will continue to replace the blown light bulbs in the parking lot and assess the need to add additional lighting.


Deacon David Thompson

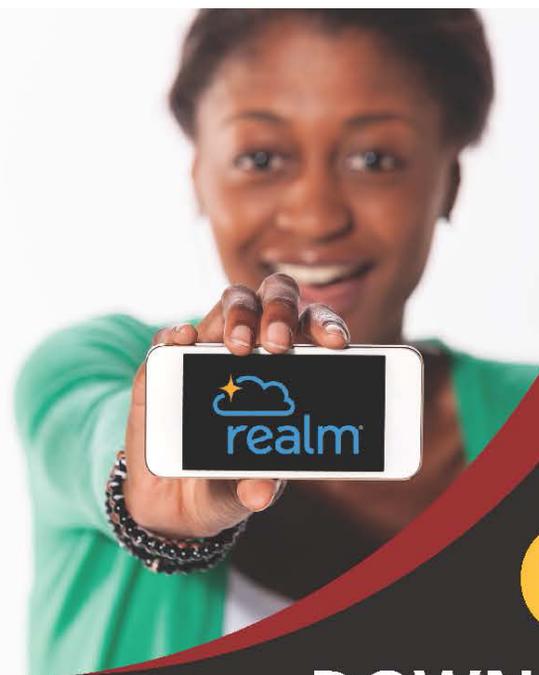
